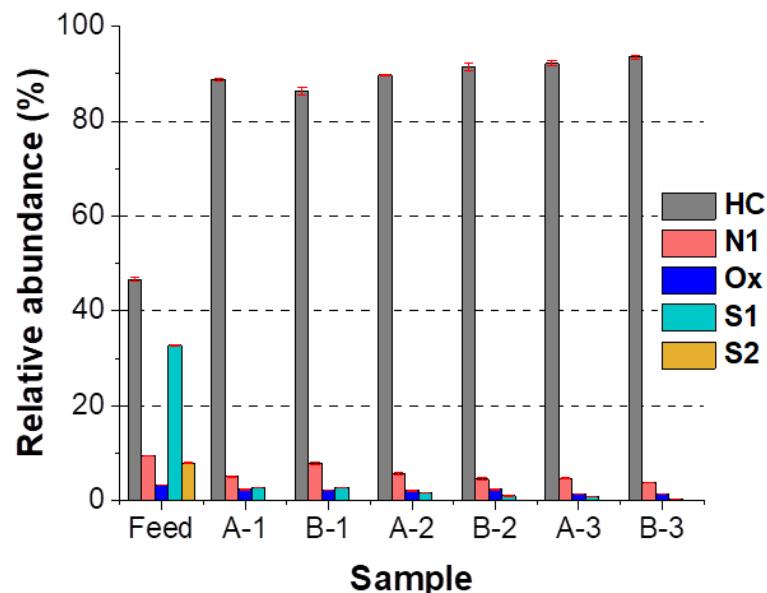


Figure S2: Comparison of obtained DBE=f(#C) diagrams for the feed and the six hydrotreated samples (A-1 to B-3) for the class HC.

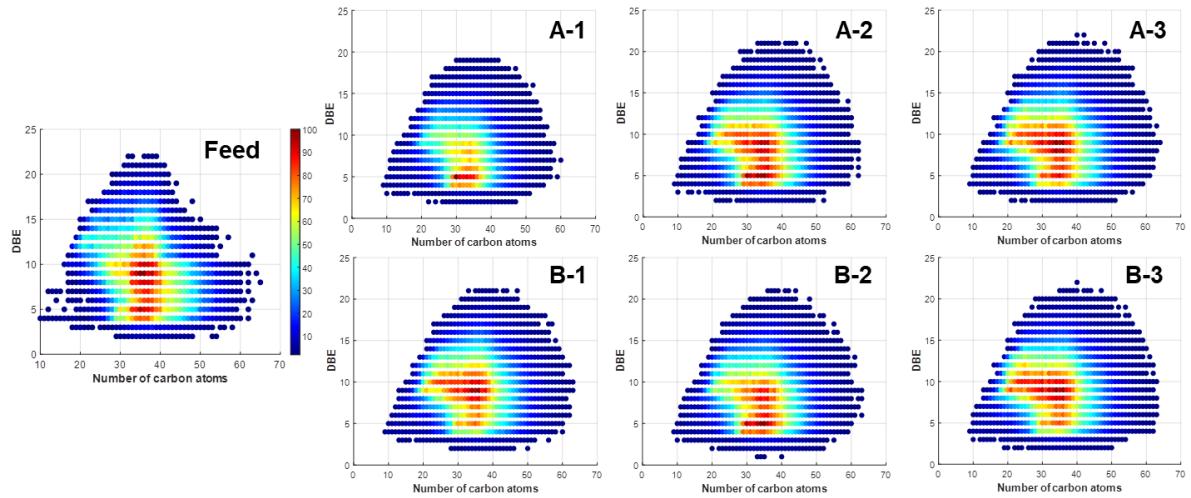
